


Community Trails Woolacombe

Beaford is a rural arts charity funded by Arts Council England. For over 50 years we have been working in partnership with schools, communities and organisations to deliver creative projects and events across North Devon. By working together we celebrate and take inspiration from the diversity of our rural and coastal landscape. Indeed, the Beaford Archive with its more than 80,000 photographs shows us how deeply we are linked to the environment from its seasonal traditions to the deep rooted farming practices passed down through generations.

This photographic collection has been preserved and made public through the *Hidden Histories* project supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund which digitised 10,000 unseen images taken in the 1970s and 80s by James Ravilious and Roger Deakins. To accompany these photographs a team of staff and volunteers recorded oral histories that document life and events from the memories of those who experienced them. Their stories are added to the archive so that future generations can hear them. We hope you will listen to their voices, look at the photographs, and reflect on the past.

Community Trails did just that through the eyes of the children who live and go to school in North Devon. With them we compared photographs from 1900s onwards to the present day to record and respond with what was important to them, whilst thinking about the future.

We hope you enjoy these trails and that you find inspiration from their work and the Beaford Archive.



Community Trails

Looking through the eyes of the children from Woolacombe Primary School, and walking in the footsteps of photographers James Ravilious and Roger Deakins, we invite you to follow our Woolacombe Community Trail...

The children of Yr5 invite you to explore the footprints of the past and present in Woolacombe. Look at their work while you walk and learn about the environment through their art and creativity. They have investigated the heritage of the Beaford Archive to create themes such as 'landscape', 'seascape' and 'trade' for you to explore through this trail. Altogether, there are 10,000 newly digitised photographs, and this trail presents you with a local selection to enjoy as you walk.

Organised by Beaford Arts, the children have worked with Devon Wildlife Trust and resident artist Clare Russell to create this work.



At the start of this residency I worked closely with the Beaford artists to create the group backdrops for the children's Points of Interest, and from this initial collaboration I was able to identify which themes to focus on for my work as the artist on the project. These ideas were explored in class art sessions, which then led to the design ideas for the larger pieces.

During the residency I have had the opportunity to work closely with the year 5 children, both as a textile artist and as their regular art teacher. I have also been able to collaborate with the class teacher to really embed the themes from the initial Beaford work into their learning - in art and across the wider curriculum. This flexible approach has meant that the children have been immersed in a creative way of working and have responded in a very positive way to the tasks and activities. These have included collaborative landscape drawing, observational sketching in our local church, working with a National Trust Ranger to learn about and research local species. Literacy was used to extend their thinking about the themes they'd discovered in James Ravilious' photos. This resulted in individual creative projects - exploding origami books, species bunting, mini weaving, habitat collage - and the larger artist-led collaborative textile pieces - a batik banner, felting, and tapestry weaving on a big loom.

A highlight for me was inviting parents, grandparents and members of our community to contribute to a 'Points of Interest' quilt, in which all the themes from the project are represented. The children planned this afternoon, and organised the layout as each square was created.

Throughout the project the children have been highly engaged and have clearly developed as artists and designers - able to contribute with confidence to the collaborative textile pieces and to create their own individual work to a high standard. It was great to see the way they sparked off each other creatively, sharing ideas and reflecting on many aspects of the creative process: composition, colour, use of media, lettering etc. They also developed a much greater ability to self-evaluate and make changes and improvements to their work. The children have been fully engaged, motivated and have all valued the experience of working in this way.

The project has provoked a lot of discussion about what is unique in our community and landscape and we are excited to share this with you.



Woolacombe'. Look out for what has changed and what has stayed the same.










Observational drawings by 9 and 10 Yr olds




Mortehoe is closely linked to Woolacombe, with a fascinating history between the two (visit tourist information and take a trip to the Mortehoe museum for more). You can continue on to Mortehoe from this trail, taking in Barricane Beach on your left, to Morte Point with seascape views as you go. Be aware this is quite a long walk for young children and families. We recommend checking the route before embarking on it, or travelling there and enjoying it separately to this trail.























Both are by James Ravilious for the Beaford Archive. He classified these as 'Good'.

Taken on the same day as the large photograph on the right, you can clearly see the difference between his artistic and documentary style in these images and the reasoning behind his classifications. Back in the classroom we tried a 'denim filter' for a digital twist to our photographic technique and enjoyed exploring the effect of both colour and black and white, on our photographs; having a debate about what worked best for each. 




